Welcome to St Matthew's Parish Church

The author of Wisdom lived in the middle of the first century BC. By that time belief in the immortality of the just with God beyond death had become accepted. Our reading says that the world as God created it was essentially good. Human beings were created to be immortal because there were created in God's image. Death came into the world as a consequence of sin. The full bitterness of death will be experienced by those who are in league with the devil. It's clear that the author is not speaking of physical death (as even the virtuous still have to die) but of moral and spiritual death. This reading serves as a backdrop to the story of the raising of the daughter of Jairus in the gospel.

In the Gospel reading we have two more miracles. In these we see Jesus' power over death, and over illness, often the forerunner of death. Mark stresses that both the woman with the haemorrhage and the daughter of Jairus were both beyond the help of any earthly power. He also stresses the great faith of the woman and of Jairus. Both believed that Jesus possessed a supernatural power to heal. Through faith in Jesus, the woman and the little girl are saved.

Both miracles are signs of God's power, restoring life and health through Jesus. The raising of the little girl is a foreshadowing of Jesus' gift of eternal life to all who believe in him.

It is our custom to spend some time in quiet preparation before the liturgy begins, and save further conversation until we meet socially for refreshments afterwards. The following reflection, based on today's themes, may be found helpful:

Reflection

Each of us has the capacity to heal.

A kind word can heal a wounded spirit;
a kind deed can heal a wounded heart.

But sometimes there is nothing we can do for the sufferer, and nothing we can say either.

In that case our only ministry is that of simple presence, like that of Mary at the foot of the cross.

Yet, just by being there, by standing alongside, we save the sufferer from feeling abandoned, and offer something very precious, namely, human comfort.

When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered round him; and he was by the lake. Then one of the leaders of the synagogue named Jairus came and, when he saw him, fell at his feet and begged him repeatedly, 'My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live.' So he went with him.

And a large crowd followed him and pressed in on him. Now there was a woman who had been suffering from haemorrhages for twelve years. She had endured much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had; and she was no better, but rather grew worse. She had heard about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, for she said, 'If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well.' Immediately her haemorrhage stopped; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. Immediately aware that power had gone forth from him, Jesus turned about in the crowd and said, 'Who touched my clothes?' And his disciples said to him, 'You see the crowd pressing in on you; how can you say, "Who touched me?" He looked all round to see who had done it. But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling, fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. He said to her, 'Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease.'

While he was still speaking, some people came from the leader's house to say, 'Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the teacher any further?' But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the leader of the synagogue, 'Do not fear, only believe.' He allowed no one to follow him except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. When they came to the house of the leader of the synagogue, he saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. When he had entered, he said to them, 'Why do you make a commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping.' And they laughed at him. Then he put them all outside, and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. He took her by the hand and said to her, 'Talitha cum', which means, 'Little girl, get up!' And immediately the girl got up and began to walk about (she was twelve years of age). At this they were overcome with amazement. He strictly ordered them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat.
