

Small beginnings: seed and growth

Welcome to St Matthew's Parish Church

In Mark 4.1-34 we have a collection of parables, most of which deal with the growth of seed. They serve as a commentary on what has been happening in Jesus' proclamation of the kingdom.

The parables of the seed that grows by itself and the mustard seed were meant to encourage the early Church, which was worried about the slow growth of the kingdom. They were telling the disciples to be patient, to trust, and not to expect instant results. Through the power of God, from small and insignificant beginnings, the kingdom will grow into something great.

It is our custom to spend some time in quiet preparation before the liturgy begins, and save further conversation until we meet socially for refreshments afterwards. The following reflection, based on today's themes, may be found helpful:

Reflection

On many an idle day have I grieved over lost time. But it is never lost, my Lord. You have taken every moment of my life in your own hands. Hidden in the heart of things you are nourishing seeds into sprouts, buds into blossoms, and ripening flowers into fruitfulness. I was tired and sleeping on my idle bed and imagining all work had ceased. In the morning I woke up and found my garden full with wonders of flowers.





Jesus said to the crowd, 'The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come.'

He also said, 'With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade.'

With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples. Mark 426-34

The Nicene Creed

Dedication of a new Humeral Veil

Description

The Veil is made from gold 'Gothic' Silk Damask, with a central orphrey of cream 'Gothic' Silk Damask, trimmed with Old Gold Diamond & Lay braid, and trimmed Gold Cotton Sateen.

The 'Chalice and Host' detail is hand embroidered – the Chalice with appliqué 'Cloth of Gold', the Host is embroidered with appliqué gold and cream 'Gothic' Silk Damask. The outline profile is in red stranded cotton thread. The surrounding sunburst is in Japanese gold thread.

Introduction

A humeral veil is most often seen at the Exposition and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. When the priest traces the sign of the cross over the people with the monstrance containing the consecrated Host, he covers his hands with the ends of the veil so that his hands do not touch the monstrance. He does so as a mark of respect for the sacred vessel, and as an indication that it is Jesus in his Eucharistic presence who blesses the people, not the priest.

Brothers and sisters, this humeral veil has been brought forward to receive a special blessing, in order to indicate that it is to be used exclusively for divine worship. We do so in thanksgiving for the life of Patricia Sykes, a faithful worshipper who was devoted to her Lord in his sacramental presence. Pat's generosity has made possible the commissioning of this vestment.

Together, then, let us pray that God will also strengthen us by his blessing. Let us ask that he who alone is holy may make us holy and worthy of his presence, so that we may celebrate the liturgy with reverence and devotion.
