

# **August Pastoral Letter from the Vicar**

# Faith in the heart of summer

As the height of summer surrounds us, August offers many blessings – a season of rest and refreshment for some, a time of adventure and exploration for others. Whether we are travelling or staying close to home, we give thanks for these weeks of pause and possibility. We pray especially for the safety of our young people during the holidays, asking God to keep them from harm and to grant them joy and discovery in their freedom.

For many, August is also a month of quiet anticipation. Examination results are due, and for students and their families alike, it can be a time of hope, concern, and reflection. Let us keep them in our prayers: that they may be proud of their efforts, supported in any disappointments, and confident in the knowledge that God's plan for each of them is rich with purpose and possibility.

This month also gives us the opportunity to deepen our faith through the celebration of three significant feast-days – each offering a different lens through which we can glimpse the glory of God.

On 6 August, we mark the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord. This moment, when Jesus is revealed in radiant glory before Peter, James, and John on the mountaintop, reminds us that behind the ordinary appearances of our world, there is always the possibility of divine light breaking through. In times of doubt or difficulty, the Transfiguration reassures us that Christ is both fully human and fully divine, and that God's glory can be seen even in the most unexpected moments of our lives.

On 15 August, we celebrate the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. In this feast, we honour Mary's faithfulness and her unique place in salvation history. Her Assumption is a sign of hope for all Christians, pointing to the promise of eternal life and the dignity of the human body. As one who bore Christ into the world, Mary shows us what it means to say a wholehearted "yes" to God – and she continues to pray for us as we strive to do the same.

Then, on 24 August, we remember St Bartholomew, one of the lesser-known apostles, yet a faithful and courageous follower of Jesus. Tradition tells us that he carried the Gospel to distant lands, and his quiet perseverance encourages us to witness to our faith not always through great acts, but through steady, faithful presence in the world.

In the spirit of this faithful witness, we look forward with great joy to the final week of August, when our parish choir will be in residence at Llandaff Cathedral. This is both a great honour and a wonderful responsibility, as they

lead worship in one of Wales' most historic and beautiful sacred spaces. When they sing in that ancient cathedral, they do so not just as musicians, but as representatives of our whole parish – bringing with them the prayer, tradition, and voice of our community.

Their ministry through music is a powerful way of proclaiming the Gospel – lifting hearts, shaping worship, and bearing witness to the beauty of holiness. If you are able to attend any of the services in Llandaff that week, please do go and support them. Your presence will affirm both their hard work and the importance of music in our life of faith.

As always, our regular pattern of services continues throughout August, and we are grateful for the locum clergy who will be ministering among us during this time. Their presence ensures that our worship remains constant, our fellowship unbroken.

So let us enter August with thankful hearts – resting, reflecting, and rejoicing. May we see God's light in the world around us, and may we, like Mary, Bartholomew, and all the saints, say "yes" once more to the call of Christ.

# Seeing things differently

August is a month that brings us 'the summer'... now I don't know about you but I often find myself wondering what that will mean, will it be full on heat of summer, torrential rain, cloudy cool days or all of the above!

We will simply have to wait and see and whatever faces us we will no doubt adapt whatever we are doing to fit the situation as best we can.



This sense of the need to adapt and see things differently brings to mind Bartholomew, one of Jesus' 12 disciples, mentioned in the gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke. John's gospel never mentions Bartholomew but does mention Nathanael (the others don't) so many think that Bartholomew and Nathanael are the same person.

I love Nathanael's first encounter with Jesus. Philip comes and tells him about Jesus of Nazareth to which Nathanael replies 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?' It's a slightly grumpy response; maybe like those hoping for a lovely summer holiday weather in August, he's been let down a few times before.

Still, what happens next is a story of being completely turned around. Jesus tells Nathanael that he saw him under the fig tree before Philip called him. Nathanael is so surprised by this he changes from sceptic to believer, and even more than Philip had said. Nathanael says to Jesus "you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel."

There are many times when we are sceptical or doubt, but when we meet Jesus for ourselves our outlook can be transformed, when we realise we are known and loved by Jesus it changes everything.

Come rain or shine this August I pray you find some time to meet Jesus in the pages of the Bible, in the family of the church, in a quiet place (like Nathanael's fig tree) where you are seen and loved.

# Coming soon...

In fact, **Saturday 13 September!** Time to get out those lycra cycling shorts or brush



up your walking shoes – the day when churches and chapels around the county are throwing their doors open to visitors. It's also an opportunity to raise a bit of cash, for St Matthew's but more importantly for the places of worship that desperately need maintenance, more than their congregations can cover. But if you're not up to walking or cycling, you can still take part by sponsoring those in our congregation who hopefully will, or those who sit and record the visitors who come to us! The county Historic Churches Trust is a body of voluntary organisations that raise money for the restoration and maintenance of historic churches and chapels, supported by the national Churches Trust. In 2012 St Matthew's received a grant of £10,000 for our own major repair works.

Ride+Stride is an annual fun event run by the Trust, and it's been taking place on the second Saturday in September across most of the country since it began in Suffolk in 1981, and not even the plague in 2020 managed to stop it! Last year, with your help, we at St Matthew's raised £380, half of which came back to St Matthew's – funds raised are divided equally between the Trust and the individually sponsored church.

# Brian Roy Dickens (1938-2025)


Our fellow worshipper at St Matthew's, Brian Dickens, died on 2 June aged 87 and his funeral was held at St Botolph's Church in his home village of Church Brampton on 25th.

Brian worked all his life in the leather trade for the family firm of Dickens Brothers, which had been founded by his grandfather in 1897. They were leather dressers, a specialist trade that applied bespoke finishes to already partly tanned leather hides. The company acquired purpose-built premises in Kettering Road, just by the junction with St Michael's Road, in 1900 and continued in operation there until Brian finally retired in 2017. The premises still exist, having been converted into flats.

Brian was for many years associated with the St Matthew's Trust, which he served as its Secretary until 2014, and until his retirement the annual accounts of the Trust were regularly prepared by Dickens Brothers' bookkeeper Mrs Parker.

Brian came from a well-established Northampton family and was cousin to the late Francis Crick of Weston Favell, the co-discoverer of DNA, and as such was often called upon to present various local and national prizes that commemorate Crick's scientific work.

This is the last article of this academic year, we are all looking forward to the summer break.

For the first time in the last five weeks we have had to cancel meetings twice, both for natural events. The first was the swarm of bees that decided to come and visit on a Monday and then again a couple of weeks later had to cancel because of the weather – 32 degree heat. We looked at what the schools were doing, plus the advice on the news. Therefore we are a little short of things to write about.

On the two evenings we did meet as normal, all sections continued working on their 'Skills for My Future' Theme Award, whilst having fun. We made full use of the outside area for a lot of the activities rather than being inside – some involved water!

On one evening the Brownies had lots of fun, and a great deal of noise could be heard emanating from the Parish Centre. The girls had been given blocks of wood and various tools – hammers, screwdrivers, pliers, screws, nails etc – and they learnt how to use the tools and what each one did.

The Guides have completed their Investigator Badge. The last part for them to complete was all about finger prints – Sellotape, paint brushes, baby powder, hand cream and black cardboard were needed. Fingerprints were taken from objects using the baby powder and Sellotape whilst using the paint brush and black cardboard, fingerprints were retrieved – just like real CSIs.

On the week following the fete, as the leaders had been so busy over the weekend, we had an outing; this year it was bowling. As usual we had a coach, and the girls and leaders headed to Hollywood Bowl for two games of bowling. For some of the girls this was their first time, others had been bowling many times, either way a lot of fun was had. The weather being dry and sunny the girls were able to sit outside for their snacks between games; they could choose between water, orange or blackcurrant for drinks, crisps, quavers, hula hoops or french fries, followed by assortment of snack-size packets of biscuits.

Café Guides was on duty at the Church Fete, and boy were we busy, serving sandwiches, paninis, cakes, bacon and sausage baps, chips, jacket potatoes with many toppings, and nachos. We were so busy leaders had to go home and bake more cakes and visit the supermarket for more supplies. The following day we were back, again it was busy. Over the weekend we used 5 kilos of bacon, 6 kilos of chips, 54 sausages, not to mention the 70 plus portions of cake.



# Café Guides Recipe for August

# Jamaican Sundae

Preparation time is very quick, but you must allow at least an hour for the pineapple to chill and five hours/overnight for the ice cream.

Use thick glasses (ie sundae glasses) that will not crack in the freezer; alternatively use a Tupperware box and decant into glasses when constructing the dessert.

## Serves 4

# Ingredients

- 425gm / 15oz can pineapple pieces, well drained
- 4 tablespoons rum
- 300ml / ½pint soft-scoop vanilla ice cream

#### To serve

- 150ml / ¼pint double cream
- 2 tablespoons desiccated coconut
- 4 maraschino cherries, drained
- 15gm / ½oz grated chocolate

#### Method

- 1) Finely chop half the pineapple, place in a bowl with half the rum. Place the remaining pineapple in a bowl with the remaining rum. Cover with cling film and refrigerate for 1 hour.
- Drain off and reserve the juice from the chopped pineapple, then quickly mix the pineapple into the ice cream with a fork. Mash the pineapple and ice cream together as quickly as possible – the ice cream should not be allowed to melt.
- Divide the mixture between four sundae glasses or put into a Tupperware box, place in the freezer for 4-5 hours, until firm, or overnight.
- 4) To serve, whip the cream until soft and standing in peaks. Whisk in the coconut and reserved juice from the crushed pineapple. Remove the glasses from the freezer and quickly pile the remaining pineapple pieces on top of the ice cream, including any liquid. Top each glass with the coconut cream, a maraschino cherry and a little grated chocolate.

If freezing the ice cream in a Tupperware box, divide this between four sundae glasses and continue as above.

\*If serving to children, omit the rum and use orange juice instead.

# **Parish Giving Scheme**

The Parish Giving Scheme exists to allow members of the St Matthew's community to support the life and work of the Parish, and the upkeep of our church, through regular giving. It provides our principal source of income and helps us meet our main financial commitments, including our contribution towards the Diocesan Common Fund (the 'Parish Share') and the costs of our employees.



The Scheme is the most tax efficient way of contributing to the church because contributions may be eligible for Gift Aid (raising your donation by 25% at no cost to either you or St Matthew's).

There are two methods of payment available: by a banker's direct debit or by weekly-numbered envelopes via the collection plate. The amount that you give is entirely confidential and is known only to the lay people who administer the Scheme.
