November Pastoral Letter from the Vicar

Dear friends,

As the Christian year draws to its close, November invites us into a deep season of remembrance, reflection, and renewal. The light fades early, the air sharpens, and creation itself seems to slow and pause – inviting us to look both backward with thanksgiving and forward in hope.

We begin the month with the Feast of All Saints (Sunday 2nd), giving thanks for the great company of men and women in every generation who have borne faithful witness to Christ. Their lives remind us that holiness is not a rare achievement but a calling for us all – the quiet, steady work of love, prayer, and service often in ordinary places. In them we glimpse the glory of God's kingdom already breaking into our world.

The following day brings All Souls' Day, the 'Commemoration of the Faithful Departed', Monday 3rd, 7.30pm), when we remember before God those we have loved but see no longer. This year, as in past years, we shall hold our Requiem Mass to pray for the departed, for the repose of their souls, and especially to uphold the recently bereaved, whom we have invited personally to join us. These moments of remembrance, of memories treasured, hold together both sorrow and thanksgiving, as we commend our loved ones to the mercy and peace of the risen Christ.

Midway through the month we gather for Remembrance Sunday, when our parish keeps silence and solemn thanksgiving for all who have given their lives in the service of others. During the Act of Commemoration, the names of Kingsley's 168 Fallen, listed in our Memorial Chapel, will again be read aloud before the Silence. Each name represents a unique story of courage and loss, woven into the fabric of our community. In remembering them, we pray also for peace – and renew our resolve to relearn past lessons, and be makers of peace in our own time.

November's liturgical rhythm also carries a thread of kingship throughout – not the worldly kind that seeks power or privilege, but the reign of Christ, whose throne is the Cross and whose crown is love. This theme reaches its fulfilment on the Feast of Christ the King, the final Sunday of the Church's year. On that day we proclaim that all things find their meaning and completion in him – that Christ is Lord not only of the Church, but of all creation, all history, all hope.

And then, as one liturgical year closes, another begins. On Sunday 30 November, the First Sunday of Advent, we begin again the journey of waiting and watching for the coming of our Lord – both in the manger throne of Bethlehem and in the fullness of his kingdom yet to come. Advent's quiet expectancy calls us to renew our faith, deepen our prayer, and open our lives afresh to God's transforming and freely offered life.

As we move through this month of remembrance and kingdom hope, may we hold before God the whole communion of saints – those who have gone before us, known and unknown, those with whom we walk now, and those yet to come. And may the love of Christ, who reigns over all things, guide us as we continue the mission entrusted to us here at St Matthew's: to be a community of faith, welcome, and witness in the heart of Kingsley and beyond.



Remember, Remember... That is, of course, the beginning of the children's rhyme about the gunpowder plot of 1605.

But Remember is a very good summing up word for the month itself.

November brings us a season of remembering. All Saints followed by All Souls as we remember those who have gone before us. The Saints of old whose lives inspire us in our Christian journey and the local, maybe only

known to us, souls who have walked with us in faith.



Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day call us to remember the horrors of war so that in remembering we might avoid such actions as lead to these tragedies.

November also marks the end of the Church year and as with every time of ending and beginning we remember what has been and we look to what will be. The church year ends with the Sunday before Advent when we remember what is important to us. We keep it as the feast of Christ the King remembering that it is in Jesus Christ that all things are held together, that it is Jesus who the saints follow and it is the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross, laying down his life for us, that inspired those who lay down their life for peace.

That Sunday is also often known as 'Stir up Sunday' from the collect rather than from the Christmas pudding and cake stirring in the kitchen! The Book of Common prayer Collect leads us to pray "Stir up, O Lord, the wills of your faithful people; that they, plenteously bringing forth the fruit of good works, may by you be plenteously rewarded; through Jesus Christ our Lord."

So in this month of November I pray that we will remember...

Those who lived faithful Christian lives (and do so too), those who we love as see no longer (cherishing our loved ones now), those who sacrifice for peace (and commit ourselves to work for peace) and finally Jesus Christ, God who left the glory of heaven to be one of us.

In our remembering may we be inspired to action, to be stirred up, faithful Christian people known for the fruit of Good Works. Amen.

It is a day to give thanks for the many lives of faith that have inspired and shaped us – for all those who have followed Christ in word and deed, and whose prayers continue to join with ours in praise of God. Let's make every effort to be part of this joyful celebration together.

Yes, it's time for this year's Parish Christmas Card Scheme!

For those who haven't joined in before, the idea of it is that you're virtually giving a card to 'the St Matthew's congregation' and what's more, you get a personalised card <u>from</u> 'the congregation' to take home and display with cards from your other friends and family. It started off as fundraising for our church, but more than that it's the fellowship that's important – we're a Christian family and it's good to send Christmas greetings to each other.

So how does it work? Cards with a quality religious image are given an insert which is <u>personal to each recipient</u> and includes the names of all parishioners in the Scheme. Parishioners sign up by means of a form which I will hand out in person as you leave after Mass on Sunday 26 October, Anita will have in the Office (please check opening hours!) from Monday 27 October, and it will be mailed out to those who have the magazine by post. I will also have forms on me on Sundays after Mass throughout November. So don't panic that you'll be missed out!

All contributions from you to the Scheme go in full to St Matthew's. The signing-up form says: "It's a fundraising opportunity, whilst bringing together the congregation's circulation of Christmas greetings among one another into a fellowship scheme. Consider how much you might have spent on individual cards for people in the congregation, then make this your donation to the Scheme (though of course you are welcome to give more!). Each person/family group who joins the Scheme then gets a personalised Christmas card to take home, containing greetings from all the other people who join."

It's such an easy and lovely (and painless) way to contribute to muchneeded fundraising for our church, and you get a quality personalised Christmas card from St Matthew's too.

The Scheme runs this year from Sunday 26 October, closing on **Advent Sunday**, **30 November**. That <u>is</u> the deadline (you'll have had <u>five</u> weeks to sign up...) and I start work producing the insert early the following day so that you will get your card in time. You do not have to wait till deadline day to return your form and donation! The signing-up form gives full details of the Scheme and what you need to do. Maybe you'll join us for the first time this year? I can show you examples of previous years' cards to explain it further.

32nd St Matthew's Multi-Aged Girlguiding

Rainbows, Brownies and Guides have been fully immersed in the 'Be Well' Theme Award, with activities and achievements that highlighted our commitment to wellbeing.

The last few weeks have been hands-on with first aid sessions run by Sooty Owl, aka Bethany, where everyone learned the importance of basic emergency skills. The girls practised bandaging, learned how to treat minor scrapes, and discussed when to seek help from adults. Each girl brought in their teddy who acted as a patient. Our girls were keen to ask questions and showed real interest in looking after themselves and others. The girls went outside to look at the defibrillator and learnt what and how it is used. The girls then discussed about how we can all help in a crisis, no matter our age.

Alex received a special award for her consistent helpfulness and kindness, and Ava completed her Charities badge by working with and for Animals in Need.

In the summer Girlguiding brought out a series of new interest badges; in pursuit of the Book Reviewer badge, the Brownies shared their favourite stories and crafted handmade bookmarks. They then chatted and discussed the books they had brought in with them. Some of the Brownies have already completed this as they had taken part in the reading challenge run by Northampton Library.

Changes are underway for Guides! The group moved to the Garden Room, offering plenty of space for activities and games. New patrols have been formed, and leadership roles have been assigned. We now have Dolphin, Starfish and Penguin Patrols.

The Guides requested to do some crafts using clay, and they created animals, noughts and crosses games and little trinket dishes, plus imaginative sculptures. Teamwork was at the heart of the activity, with everyone sharing ideas and helping one another. Once dry, the crafts are now being painted ready to be taken home.

As with Brownies, Guides too have more new interest badges. Friendship was chosen by the girls and to start this they have started making friendship bracelets using embroidery in a variety of colours. Once finished they will share with friends.

As Sparkle Owl, aka Paula, was on holiday, Mark came to help and the Guides got hands-on with a torch-making activity, letting their imaginations run wild. Using LED bulbs and batteries and cardboard, the Guides each made a unique and fully functioning torch to take home.

Our annual Harvest collection was a resounding success. The girls, with help from their families, gathered donations for the Hope Centre, supporting those in need in our community. We are also grateful to the Wednesday Rainbows, Brownies and Guides, the Cubs, Beavers and Scouts, plus the choir and congregation of St Matthew's. The centre expressed their gratitude and thanks for all our generosity, and the girls learned about giving and working together to make a difference.

A heartfelt thank you goes to Amelia's mum, who has stepped in to help with Brownies; this will make all our activities possible – and more fun for everyone.















Café Guides Recipe for November

All Souls' Day Cakes

These little cakes are a cross between a biscuit and a scone, and are traditionally made for All Souls' Day which is on the 2 November, and were originally given to the poor by the rich. Packed with currants and mixed spice, these lovely little cakes are delicious with an afternoon cuppa. I came across this recipe whilst visiting the National Trust property at Blickling Hall.

Ingredients

- 175g butter (6ozs)
- 175g caster sugar (6ozs)
- 3 egg yolks
- 450g plain flour (1lb)
- 2 teaspoons mixed spice
- 100g currrants (4ozs)
- a little milk to mix

Method

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 180C/375F/Gas mark 5.
- 2. Cream the butter and sugar together and then beat in the egg yolks, one at a time.
- 3. Sift the flour into another bowl with the mixed spice and then add them to the butter, sugar and egg yolk mixture.
- 4. Stir in the currants and add enough milk to make a soft dough, similar to scones.
- 5. Roll the dough out and cut out little cakes with a biscuit cutter. Mark each cake with a cross and then place them on a greased and/or lined baking sheet.
- 6. Bake the cakes for 10 to 15 minutes, or until golden brown.
- 7. Cool on a wire rack and the store in an airtight tin for up to 5 days.



Coast to Coast: A Journey Across England

Six years ago, as I bade farewell to full-time employment, I shared an ambition with my colleagues: one day, I would walk Alfred Wainwright's legendary Coast to Coast footpath. The 192-mile route from St Bees to Robin Hood's Bay had captured my imagination, and now, finally, the time had come.

The decision to walk alone came easily. I wanted the freedom to set my own pace, though I knew from my research that the summer trail would bring plenty of company along the way. For weeks, I pored over maps and booking websites, carefully planning fifteen days of walking across sixteen nights of varied accommodation: youth hostels, hotels, village pubs, and Air B&Bs. Initially, I'd envisioned carrying my own gear, but wisdom prevailed. Having never walked with a full pack, I arranged for Packhorse, a Sherpa company, to transport my luggage between stops.



On a glorious 14th of July, I set off from Long Buckby, changing trains at Rugby, Crewe, and Carlisle before finally arriving at St Bees. After settling into my accommodation, I explored the village and discovered the beautiful Priory church with its impressive Norman doorway, apparently home to a very fine organ.

Morning brought an unwelcome surprise: torrential rain and fierce winds greeted day one. Undeterred, I made my way to St Bees beach, collected the traditional pebble, and began the fifteen-mile trek to Ennerdale

Bridge. The coastal path led me up dramatic cliffs before turning inland, rain hammering down relentlessly. At Cleator, halfway through, I found refuge in a church porch alongside two German ladies and two Norwegian women, all of us grateful for sandwiches eaten in the dry. By evening, I arrived at Ennerdale Bridge rather bedraggled but was warmly welcomed at the Shepherd's Arms. Over an excellent dinner, I chatted with a fascinating couple (she English, he German, both living in Australia). All eight rooms were full that night, each occupied by fellow Coast-to-Coasters.

The second day transformed everything. After a hearty breakfast, I walked towards Ennerdale Water under perfect skies, the Lake District unfolding in all its glory. The path hugged the lake's northern shore before entering miles of conifer forest. Eventually, I emerged at Black Sail Hut, the Lake District's most remote youth hostel, a former shepherd's bothy now closed, but perfect for lunch. A young Belgian man arrived just after me, soon followed by others seeking the same respite.





The afternoon brought a challenging climb up stone steps, where three men were working to repair the path, their materials airlifted by helicopter. The summit rewarded us with breathtaking views before we descended past an old slate mine toward Borrowdale Youth Hostel. That evening, I shared supper with the German ladies from the church porch, while the Belgian chap pitched his tent nearby.

Another beautiful morning dawned as I tackled Lining Crag and Greenup Edge. The climb was steep, the views spectacular, the descent tricky and exhausting. Reaching Grasmere felt like an achievement. My husband Fabian had been evacuated there during the war, staying with siblings while their uncle served as vicar, so I sought out the church and what I believe was the old vicarage, apparently where Wordsworth was born.



Two more days carried me through the Lake District, culminating in the toughest day yet: an eleven-hour, eighteen-mile marathon from Glenridding to Shap. The rough terrain around Ullswater reservoir tested every muscle. though the stunning views from The Knott and Kidsty Pike made every step worthwhile. When my Air B&B hostess rang at 6pm,

concerned for my whereabouts, I was still walking. I finally stumbled in at 7pm, utterly exhausted.

The Yorkshire Dales brought easier going: twenty miles of glorious moorland walking to Kirby Stephen. Arriving around 6pm on Sunday, I discovered that only an Indian restaurant was serving food. There, I joined six other walkers, ₁₄all of us sharing tales over curry.



The following day took us past Ravenseat Farm (famous from "Our Yorkshire Farm"), though sadly no teas were being served. Beyond Keld, I walked alongside limestone cliffs and the wide River Swale, where swimmers were enjoying the cool water. The Keld Lodge Hotel proved excellent, its dining room overlooking the dales and filled with fellow walkers.

The next four days brought gentler, low-level walking beside the River Swale.
After the first day of torrential rain, we enjoyed merely occasional showers, a welcome improvement. I walked to Reeth, then Richmond through drizzle that clouded the views, and on to Danby

Wiske's solitary pub. From there, I reached Osmotherley, where I'd booked a hostel alongside two ladies from Devon who'd become familiar faces on the trail.

From Osmotherley, the North York Moors rose before us. The steep climbs and tricky descents of the Cleveland Way offered spectacular views, the distant coast finally visible. At Chop Gate near Clay Bank Top, a hill farmer collected me for the night. The evening spent on their working farm was memorable.





Morning brought me to an old ironstone railway track leading toward Blakey Ridge, fairly easy walking that eventually revealed the Lion Inn, a remote moorland pub that would be my night's refuge. Arriving at lunchtime, I found the place heaving with Sunday crowds: bikers and day-trippers enjoying drinks and lunch. Five fellow walkers had already claimed their spots.

The penultimate day took me to Grosmont and the Railway Tavern, an easy, pleasant walk.



Then came the final day. Soon, Whitby Abbey appeared on the horizon, visible for mile after mile, drawing me onward. At last, I descended the steep hill into Robin Hood's Bay and walked down to the shore where we all took our ceremonial photographs. Remarkably, one couple had started the same day I had and finished alongside me.

The next morning, I caught a bus to Scarborough, then trains through Huddersfield, Manchester Piccadilly, Rugby, and finally home to Long Buckby.

It was a remarkable experience, filled with memories I'll treasure: the people encountered, the churches discovered, the landscapes traversed. Walking from one coast of England to the other gave me an immense sense of achievement and a deeper appreciation for this beautiful part of the country.





My memories of Dame Patricia Routledge

I first met Patricia when I was fourteen years old. I was on the Peterborough Diocesan Youth Committee when her brother Graham Routledge was the Diocesan Chancellor. I had no idea who she was even though she had a Tony Award. As far as I was concerned, she was visiting her brother for a few days at the same time as we were meeting at Canonry House as The Deanery was then called.

As I was representing St Lawrence Church Towcester, Canon Graham took me to see a corner of the Cathedral Precinct, to show me the remains of what was once a Chapel dedicated to St Laurence. A double piscina and the columns of the Chancel arch remind us of what was once a place of prayer and refreshment for the sick and elderly members of the Benedictine abbey. St Laurence was a second century martyr, a Deacon in Rome, who famously met his painful end (roasted on a gridiron) under the persecutions of the Emperor Valerian. As with so many ancient saints, the stories got embellished and it seems unlikely that he said: "I am cooked on that side; you can turn me over"! What he is also alleged to have said and done, do however make very fitting last words for a saint. Challenged by the authorities to hand over the 'treasures of the church', he gathered the poor and frail members of the community, whom he served, and led them from the building saying: "Behold the treasures of the Church". Patricia was with us and suggested we pray that we follow his example.

On our way home Reverend Harry Waite who was giving us young ones a lift back told us who she was. I don't remember being particularly impressed. I guess this was because the type of performances she had done were not my usual choice of entertainment and there was no YouTube or even internet to look her up.

Having met her I began to take an interest in her work and thoroughly enjoyed the Alan Bates monologues that she did during the eighties and Kitty on the Victoria Wood Show.







In the early nineties I was going past Christchurch Church and Hall and saw tv cameras, so being the curious (nosey) person that I am I made it my business to find out what was going on. I was told by the Vicar that it was an unnamed BBC series starring Patricia Routledge. Of course we now know this as Keeping Up Appearances with Mrs Bucket ("it's pronounced Bouquet!") as the



central character. When they were next filming around Abington I hovered around and eventually caught sight of her. I called her name, and she threw a wave and hello back at me then said hang on and came over, with a production assistant hurrying behind her. Her words to the assistant were, "Don't worry, I know him," I was very surprised she had remembered me as this was six or seven years after our meeting and we hadn't seen each other in between. Anyway, we had a quick conversation and I wished her well with the new show.

Fast forward to the late nineties when I was working for a supported housing charity in Wellingborough and looking for ways of funding a new house. Somebody suggested a Candlelit Supper as a fundraising event. I sent a letter to Patricia Routledge via her agent. In it I reminded her of my connection with her late brother and our meeting. I asked if she would be willing to host a Candlelit Supper in the style of Mrs Bucket. She sent a lovely letter back refusing my invite but said she would be willing to attend an event and give a talk about her life. I wrote back saying what a good idea. We set a date, and I invited all the local business and 'money' people I knew of. When Patricia arrived, she had a private meeting with the Trustees, staff and clients. During this time she apologised that she couldn't fulfil my original request saying Hyacinth Bucket was the type of person that she despised. After eating, Patricia gave a witty, entertaining talk and by the end of the evening we had promises of donations totalling £23k including a very generous one from Patricia herself.

I was present as a guest of my godson when Patricia accepted her honorary doctorate at the University of Chester graduation ceremony at Chester Cathedral in 2019. Dame Patricia's enduring career is a testament to her passion, humility, and work ethic. She has inspired generations of performers with her professionalism and her ability to find humanity and humour in every role. However, I remember her for her warmth, modesty, and generosity of spirit.

Parish Giving Scheme

The Parish Giving Scheme exists to allow members of the St Matthew's community to support the life and work of the Parish, and the upkeep of our church, through regular giving. It provides our principal source of income and helps us meet our main financial commitments, including our contribution towards the Diocesan Common Fund (the 'Parish Share') and the costs of our employees.



The Scheme is the most tax efficient way of contributing to the church because contributions may be eligible for Gift Aid (raising your donation by 25% at no cost to either you or St Matthew's).

There are two methods of payment available: by a banker's direct debit or by weekly-numbered envelopes via the collection plate. The amount that you give is entirely confidential and is known only to the lay people who administer the Scheme.
