#### October Pastoral Letter from the Vicar

Dear friends,

October comes with the beauty and richness of autumn. The days shorten, the air cools, and we see once more the changing and rhythm of the seasons. These patterns remind us of God's ordering of creation, a cycle of growth, fruitfulness, rest, and renewal. At Harvest, we pause to acknowledge this rhythm, to give thanks for the bounty of the earth, and to reflect on our dependence upon God's sustaining hand in every season of our lives.

On Sunday 5 October, we shall celebrate our Harvest Thanksgiving with an All Age Mass at 10.15am, and later with a joyful Songs of Praise at 4.00pm, followed by a Harvest meal in church. These gatherings allow us to offer our thanks to God for his generosity in creation: the sun and the rain, the seed and the soil, the hands that sow, and the labour that reaps. Harvest reminds us that we live from God's abundance, not our own making. Each loaf of bread, each piece of fruit, each meal we share is a sign of his boundless love.

This year, our Harvest also coincides with the Church of England's Generosity Week, which reminds us that gratitude leads naturally to generosity. As we rejoice in God's gifts, we are called to mirror that generosity in our own lives. We think not only of how we care for the environment and steward creation wisely, but also of how we support the life of our parish. Like many others, we face an uncertain financial future. Our giving – whether of time, talent, or money – sustains our worship, our buildings, and our mission in this community. To give is not merely to keep the lights on; it is to join in God's work of light and life in this place.

At the same time, Harvest thanksgiving cannot be complete without remembering those who go hungry, whether in our own town or across the world. As climate change and global warming disrupt weather patterns, the poorest and most vulnerable often suffer first and most. We are challenged to live responsibly and compassionately, ensuring that the fruits of creation are shared justly, and that our own habits of living do not deprive others of life's necessities.

The following Sunday, 12 October, will be another day of joy as we admit new members into the Society of Our Lady of Walsingham and our Parish Cell. This is a sign of growth in our parish's spiritual life, and we give thanks for those committing themselves afresh to prayer and devotion. We also recall with gladness our recent pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham, where we drew close to Christ in the prayers of Mary's holy house. Pilgrimage teaches us, too, about the rhythm of life: a time to journey away, to rest in God's presence, and to return home renewed for service.

So let October be for us a month of rhythm, gratitude, and generosity: the rhythm of creation and worship, the gratitude for God's gifts, and the generosity that flows from knowing his love. May our thanksgiving this month not only lift our hearts in praise, but also shape our lives in Christlike service, generosity, and joy.

#### **Chippings from the Vicar's Work Bench**

#### **Parish Centre Refurbishment**

Many of you will be aware that the project to update and upgrade our Parish Centre is now well advanced. Much has already been achieved, and work continues to bring this valuable facility up to contemporary standards.

The Centre has been redecorated throughout, with the upper portion of the hall scheduled for completion during the Christmas holiday following a recent ceiling inspection. New curtains have been fitted in the Garden Room, Blue Room, and office, and the carpet tiles in the Garden Room will shortly be renewed. The hall floor – faithful in service since 1968 – will be sanded and sealed, giving it a new lease of life.

In addition, some of the double glazing has been replaced, repairs to the roof covering carried out, and solar panels successfully installed on the roof. We also hope to explore the possibility of cavity wall insulation in due course.

A new exterior noticeboard will soon be affixed to the wall beside the main entrance, bringing to an end the unsightly practice of sticking posters to windows.

Our aim is to ensure that the Parish Centre not only serves our community well but is also attractive and efficient as a venue for hire, providing a much-needed source of revenue to support the ongoing life and mission of our parish.

Our monthly Eucharist, with prayers for wholeness and healing for those who have asked our intercessions, will take place on Monday 6 October at 7.00pm in the Lady Chapel.

It is expected that the name of the new Archbishop of Canterbury will be announced during October. Whoever is chosen, please keep that person in your prayers. The responsibility is immense, and all who wish the Church well will want to uphold our new Archbishop with prayer and support.

#### Ride+Stride 2025

On Saturday 13 September St Matthew's took part in the annual 'Ride+Stride for Churches', organised by the county Historic Churches Trust – voluntary organisations that raise money for the restoration and maintenance of historic churches and chapels, supported by the national Churches Trust.

Roger, Tony and I manned St Matthew's over the four hours we were open, from 10am to 2pm, to record the riders and striders who came through our doors doing their bit to raise money on behalf of their own churches. All churches taking part get half of the sponsorship money back from the Trust.

Our first visitors were as usual hot off the mark, from Kingsley Park Methodist Church across the road, who always come in a group – five of them this year. Some years people have been queuing at the door waiting to be let in! People normally turn up usually in groups of two or three, and tend to be in, get registered, and out – there is a desire to get to as many churches as they can while they're open. Some support their own church alone.

Not many actually want to have a look around, but we always offer them our Welcome leaflet, which they often willingly accept anyway. Regular visitors I guess have already been here, done that, bought the T-shirt! They all stop for a chat though, and many say how much they always enjoy the day and what a good cause they are pleased to do it for. Some are quite colourful characters; we had one man in his 70s who had started off at Moulton Church to enjoy their 8am Men's Breakfast (he had walked from his house in The Headlands), then walked back into Northampton and was still going strong when he came to us at 12.10pm. He stayed chatting until 12.30pm (not even sitting down) before moving on to get more churches in... I recommended that when he had done his last church he should get the bus home from there – no need to walk after he'd finished!

As the time goes on the visitors tend to thin out, and after 1.15pm we thought

we'd seen the last visitor. On the stroke of 2pm I approached the front door, keys in hand to lock up, and another four people arrived! So of course they came in, very apologetic for it being so late, and these people did want to have a quick look around – they had travelled from Bedfordshire and specially wanted to see St Matthew's.

This year we had 25 visitors at St Matthew's – of course, you choose which churches to visit, there is not a set route to follow, and as many or as few as you are able. Disappointingly, no-one had volunteered to ride or stride for us though. Before arthritic knees etc called time on us, we had a little band who enjoyed the social aspect of going for a walk on a Saturday with church friends and raising money at the same time, seeing inside churches that may not be open otherwise apart from services. They are all interesting and different. We had a coffee and cake stop further down the Kettering Road, and a lunch break in town. From that Happy Band, just Roger and myself are still going strong, but now in a sitting-down role. There is the NHCT Annual Report in the bookstall area, highlighting various churches/chapels and why they have received their grants over the past year, and at the back details reports from various churches from last year's event, and includes one from our own Nick Bailey. Do have a look and maybe be inspired to give it a go next year?

Thanks to our own generous sponsors, St Matthew's has raised £255 at the time of writing this article, £95 short of what we raised last year. There is still time to make that grow before I send it off – so if you've been meaning to but haven't yet, please see me without delay!

#### **Ann Walker Magazine Article February 1976**

My late mother, Ann Walker, had a treasured set of archives which I was recently looking through; it included a beautiful letter written to her by my father Colin on their wedding day, 12 April 1955.

I also found a copy of St Matthew's Parish Magazine from February 1976. The Revd John I Morton had recently joined as Vicar in December 1975.

There is an article in the magazine written by my mother which I found very moving, and I would like to share this with you exactly as it was published 49 years ago:



#### My Faith and My Work

An article by a Nursing Sister who is a member of our Congregation and is in charge of the Intensive Care Unit at the General Hospital:

A human being in severe physical illness is entirely dependent upon other human beings. That illness may be of the body, but to a Christian a person is also made of mind and spirit. We believe that we are made in the likeness of God, and He sent his only Son into the world that we should believe, and for our redemption.

It is my privilege to minister to the sick in their hours of greatest need and in the belief that I was given at birth the ability to use my hands, my head and my heart to the glory of God and in the service of my fellow men. The doing of God's will is what gives meaning to every situation whether it is happy or revolting, and I have been given the good fortune of a happy team of fellow workers all with the devotion that must go with such work.



Normally in great suffering it is not possible to see any good that can ever come out of it. Exactly how God makes use of our service we can never understand fully, and often have no clue at all. The Christian faith makes possible an attitude to suffering in virtue of which it is not wasted experience and useless pain, but a giver of life. All experience refused is a waste of time and there follows an impoverishment of the personality. This experience will encompass

in my work the support of a patient as he dies – or as he recovers from severe illness; the support of relatives in bereavement or joy with them in the recovery of a loved one; and the support of fellow members of staff at times of particular stress. But not in my strength – we cannot forget the haunting sense of belonging to God and to one another. My husband and my family and the grace we receive week by week at the altar of God in the Holy Eucharist encourage and support us each and every day.

When we pray for someone in the name of Christ we are standing within God's redemptive purpose and asking that that purpose may reach out and enfold him, and at the same time we are affirming our desire that we, if possible, may be used to bear God's mercy to him. We may well be used directly, but the situation may be one in which we cannot be used in some act of direct service, and we go on in the sure and certain hope that the loving purpose of God is being worked out. We are aware of the multiple nature of God's will. We need to learn our dependence on Him and on each other.

#### A Walk Round the Monopoly Board

Having joined the Ramblers in January to do some longer day walks, I spotted that the local Northampton group had advertised a 'Monopoly Board Walk' in London on 4 September. It sounded like an interesting day out, although at 17 miles, not a short one.

I set off by train from Long Buckby. We arrived a little late into Euston, where we met our walk leader, Chris, on platform 4. From there, we made a brief detour via St Pancras to pick up anyone arriving there. Our group numbered 11 as we left the station, with two more joining us about half an hour later.

We began along Euston Road, setting off to walk the Monopoly board (not in order, of course). Along the way, I chatted with a woman from Brighton and a younger walker from Canary Wharf, who was taking photos of every location. Towards the end, she admitted she would be going home to sleep for three days; she was completely exhausted.

We paused frequently to regroup and to tick off each Monopoly location, and the route took us past many notable landmarks beyond the game board itself.

One highlight was walking through Spitalfields, where we came across the Herd of Hope: a group of bronze elephants representing real orphaned elephants cared for by the Sheldrick Wildlife Trust (pictured).

We continued on to Liverpool Street Station, passed the Tower of London (which was 'in jail' for the purposes of the game), and crossed Tower Bridge for a long trek to Old Kent Road, the only Monopoly property south of the river. After passing the Shard, we returned north via London Bridge and walked along part of the Embankment, before passing St Paul's Cathedral (pictured),



and then the Old Bailey, which stood in for 'Go to Jail'.

Other memorable stops included Covent Garden, Piccadilly Circus, Carnaby Street and Park Lane.

The weather held for most of the day, although we did have to shelter under an awning during one particularly heavy downpour. We took a couple of short breaks, around 20 minutes each, and finally reached Marylebone Station, the last location on the board, at around 6pm.



It was a very enjoyable, if tiring, day. But walking remains one of the best ways to discover London and cities like it.

#### 32<sup>nd</sup> St Matthew's Multi-Aged Girlguiding

We have now returned back from the long summer vacation. We finished in July, and we were going home with the sun still shining, light nights and feeling warm (sometimes too warm!). Our first meeting was on 8 September and when we left it was dark with a definite chill in the air.

Just because it is the summer holidays Guiding does not stop. We know that for many of our girls they would not be going on holiday or having days out; therefore we try to arrange a day out to Jubilee, the Girlguiding camp site at Castle Ashby. On Tuesday 5 August we took Brownies and Guides to Castle Ashby, as always. We went by



coach, leaving the Parish Centre at 9.30am, and on arrival we soon got activities underway, one of which was to create a 'person' out of natural items they found in and around the campsite. Again, using leaves and flowers that they could find, bracelets were made, and this was followed by a natural scavenger hunt. After lunch the girls played games before collecting wood, preparing and lighting our campfire. We were so lucky with this, the weather had been hot and dry for a number of weeks and not long after we had been there, the Estate and fire brigade banned all fires. Once the fire was lit, it was time to make s'mores – always a treat and something the girls look forward to.







Back in February this year we had a new leader join us. Her first experience of Café Guides was in March, and when she saw what we did, her words were "Have you got a food hygiene rating?", to which we replied "No, but we haven't killed anyone in 13 years!" Conversations and discussions followed whereby she told us about her Mum's church in Stoke-on-Trent where she does something similar, and they have had to get a food hygiene rating. Once we decided "Yes, we needed to register ourselves and get inspected",

the hard work began. Two leaders (Mark and Martin) now have their Level 1 Food Hygiene Certificates, whilst Bethany, Yasmin, Paula and I all have Level 2 and Georgina has Level 3. Paula and I both have Allergy Training Certificates, and I have HACCP. Mark has gained certificates as a Fire Warden, COSSH as well PAT Testing. All of us have First Response and Bethany also has HSE First Aid at Work.

With the training done, next was to make a very long list of equipment we should have, knives and scissors for food preparation in yellow, blue, green, white, red and purple, all to be used for different food, the same for chopping boards, food probes to make sure food is kept and served at the right temperatures, frying pans and food containers. Thermometers for the refrigerator and freezer. Not only do our food utensils need to be colour coded but also our cleaning equipment – buckets, mops, brooms, dustpans and brushes, dish cloths disposable, dish cloths washable, as well as spray bottles for our cleaning products. Each of these items being in red, yellow and green – kitchen, toilets and public areas all having its own colour.

All our cleaning products must be 'professional' and meet the necessary BN... Numbers. There are cleaners and sanitisers for all areas, and we now have to keep all chemicals in a COSSH cupboard with the appropriate COSSH sheets.

In addition to all of the above there is the documentation that needs to be completed, pages and pages of it. All the products we serve have to have an allergy 'recipe card', our menus have to have allergy advice on them, our pre-packed cakes have to be appropriately labelled. Even what we wear must be documented.

Usually, the inspection is done as a spot check; however because they were coming to the Parish Centre, they had to give us some notice so that we could let them in. With less than 48 hours' notice, an inspector from West Northamptonshire Environmental Health came to visit. They inspected our certificates, where we kept our dry goods, both our cooking and cleaning equipment, checked our documentation, asked lots of questions. An hour after they arrived we were awarded a 5-star rating; although we only do Café Guides once a month, plus the Church Fete and Christmas Fayre and our Craft Fairs, she was very impressed and commented that we had a very professional set up. At this moment in time on the Food Standards Agency website it states we are awaiting inspection; we are just waiting for our rating to go live.

It was a lot of hard work, learning undertaken to get leaders accredited and certificated, a mound of documentation to be completed, not to mention the ordering of equipment and supplies, but it was worth it.

#### Café Guides Recipe for October

The weather has now got that autumnal feel to it in the mornings and late evening. Creamy chicken,

apples and cider – what's not to love for a cosy supper. Comfort food at its best.

#### **Somerset Chicken** (As served at Café Guides in September) *Ingredients*

- 6 boneless chicken breasts, skin on
- salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 75g/2½oz butter, plus extra to serve
- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 2 onions, peeled and sliced
- 4 tbsp plain flour
- 2 tbsp wholegrain mustard
- 2 dessert apples, peeled, cores removed, sliced into batons
- 110g/4oz button mushrooms, sliced
- 250ml/9floz chicken stock
- 300ml/10½floz cider
- 1 tbsp finely chopped fresh sage
- 250ml/9floz double cream
- 300g/10½oz cheddar, grated
- 6 baked potatoes, to serve
- butter, to serve

#### Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas 6.
- 2. Season the chicken breasts with salt and freshly ground black pepper.
- 3. Heat a large frying pan until smoking, then add half of the butter and oil. Fry the chicken breasts in batches, skin-side down first, for 1-2 minutes on both sides, or until golden-brown all over.
- 4. Transfer the chicken breast to a deep-sided roasting tray and roast in the oven for 25 minutes, or until the chicken is cooked through (NB: the chicken is cooked through when the juices run clear when the thickest part is pierced with a skewer.) Keep warm.
- 5. Return the pan to the heat and add the remaining butter and oil. Add the onions and cook for 4-5 minutes, or until softened but not coloured. Stir in the flour and the mustard and cook for a further 1-2 minutes. Add the apples and mushrooms and cook for a further minute, then pour over the chicken stock.

- 6. Bring to the boil, then add the cider and return to the boil. Cook for 1-2 minutes, then lower the heat, add the sage and stir in the cream. Simmer for a further 5-6 minutes, then season to taste, with salt and freshly ground black pepper.
- 7. Pour the sauce over the chicken so that it is completely covered.
- 8. Preheat the grill to high.
- 9. Sprinkle the cheddar cheese over the chicken and place under the grill for 4-5 minutes, or until the cheese is melted, golden-brown and bubbling.
- To serve, place a baked potato topped with a knob of butter on each serving plate. Spoon the chicken alongside and serve. A green vegetable and some carrots would complete.

#### **Parish Giving Scheme**

The Parish Giving Scheme exists to allow members of the St Matthew's community to support the life and work of the Parish, and the upkeep of our church, through regular giving. It provides our principal source of income and helps us meet our main financial commitments, including our contribution towards the Diocesan Common Fund (the 'Parish Share') and the costs of our employees.
