Welcome to St Matthew's Parish Church

Safeguarding St Matthew's is committed to providing a safe environment for all who come. If you have any concerns, please speak with one of our welcomers or a churchwarden who may be identified by their lanyard. They will be happy to help you.

Live streaming Please note that this service is being streamed. You may sit where you wish. If, however, you prefer not to be seen online, please sit in a side aisle. The administration of Holy Communion will not be shown.

GDPR Some of St Matthew's services (most Sunday mornings and some special services) are live-streamed or recorded for those who cannot attend church in person. Under GDPR, the church must gain the consent of anyone whose image may be captured, as this constitutes collection of "personal data". This includes clergy, readers/intercessors, musicians and congregation. Whilst every attempt is made not to capture the faces of members of the congregation, this may occasionally happen if people turn around or move around the church during the service. The exception is communion, when the congregation is not filmed. The side aisles and back of the nave are so far as possible film-free areas not covered by the camera. Any-one whose personal data is collected must give their consent. Consent forms are available both in church and on the website. The full policy can be read on our parish website or on the noticeboards in church.

Toilet and baby changing facilities may be found at the base of the church tower. There is also a small servery.

For younger children In the north aisle (nearest to Collingwood Road), a carpeted area equipped with age-related Christian resources is provided. Please feel free to make use of these facilities.

Our response to God's generosity

Welcome to our celebration of the Parish Mass on this Second Sunday of Christmas. As the season continues, the Church invites us to move more deeply into the mystery of the Incarnation, not simply rejoicing that Christ has been born, but reflecting on who he is for us and what it means that God has chosen to live among his people.

Our readings today offer a rich tapestry of this theme. From Ecclesiasticus we hear the beautiful portrayal of divine Wisdom, coming forth from God and seeking a dwelling-place among humanity. Wisdom finds her home in the midst of God's people, planted and rooted in their life. This ancient vision prepares us for the fullness of God's self-giving in Christ. The psalm continues the note of wonder and praise, celebrating the God who strengthens and blesses his people, who feeds and sustains all creation. The God who orders the stars and commands the seasons is also the One who cares intimately for his own.

In the Gospel according to John, the poetic prologue reaches its profound climax: "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us." The eternal Word through whom all things were made enters our human condition completely, sharing our life that we might share his. Though the world often fails to recognise him, to those who receive him he gives the astonishing gift of becoming children of God. In Christ we behold the fullness of grace and truth, God's glory revealed not in distant majesty but in a human face.

Let us prepare to meet the living Word in word, sacrament, and community, giving thanks for the God who has come to make his home among us.

It is our custom to spend some time in quiet preparation before the liturgy begins, and save further conversation until we meet socially for refreshments afterwards. The following reflection, based on today's themes, may be found helpful:

Reflection

When God's Son came on earth, he came dressed in the cloak of our weak and mortal humanity: 'They wrapped the baby in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger.' Like an acorn that falls to earth, silently and unheralded, in a remote corner of the forest, and which grows into a great oak tree, so from these lowly origins Jesus grew up to show us the greatness of our humanity.


